# How do School Counselors Implement the Program?

## Sample Distribution of Total School Counselor Time

<b>Delivery System Component</b>	<b>Elementary School % of Time</b>	<b>Middle School % of Time</b>	<b>High School % of Time</b>
<b>I. Guidance Curriculum</b>	35-45%	25-35%	15-25%
<b>II. Individual Student Planning</b>	5-10%	15-25%	25-35%
<b>III. Responsive Services</b>	30-40%	30-40%	25-35%
<b>IV. System Support</b>	10-15%	10-15%	15-20%

# I. Guidance Curriculum component includes:

- Academic skills support
- Organizational, study and test taking skills, social emotional character development
- Career awareness and planning – *i.e.*, Naviance, College Board
- Post-secondary planning and application process – *i.e.*, Naviance, College Board

## II. Individual Student Planning component includes:

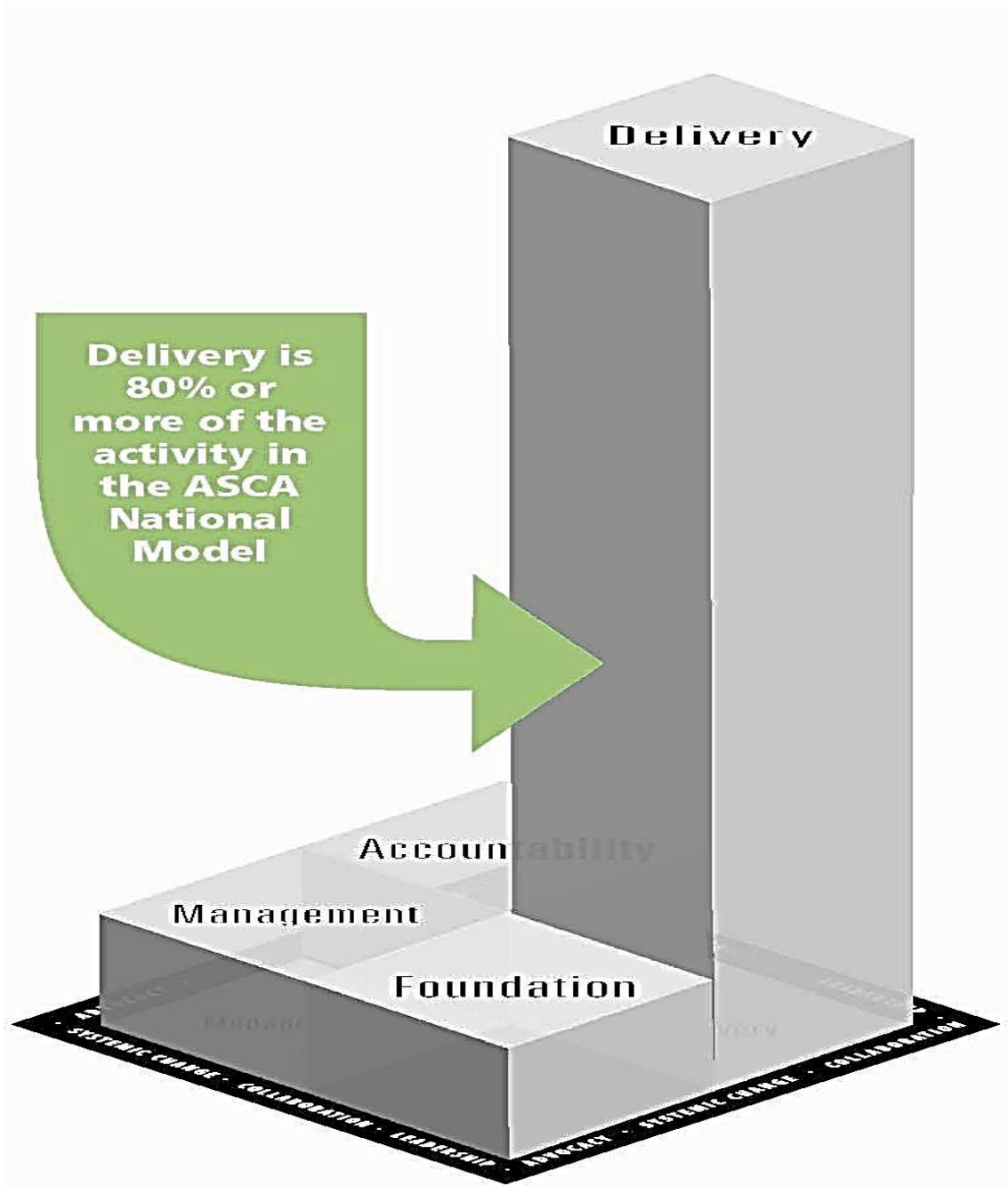
- Academic plans
- Goal setting
- Problem solving
- Education in understanding self, including strengths and weaknesses
- Transition plans
- College and career planning

### **III. Responsive Services component includes:**

- Consultation / collaboration with other professionals, faculty, community, child study teams, administration
- Individual and small group counseling
- Individual / family crisis intervention
- Peer facilitation
- Referrals

## IV. System Support component includes:

- Consultation and collaboration
- Program management and operation
- Professional development
- Working with
  1. Parents
  2. Students
  3. Teachers
  4. Administrators
  5. Community
