NJ Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights Act (ABR) N.J.S.A. 18A:37-13 et seq.

Legislative Intent of ABR:

- to provide "a safe and civil environment in school (that) is necessary for students to learn and achieve high academic standards."
- to strengthen standards and procedures for preventing, reporting, investigating and responding to incidents of HIB that occur in school and off school premises
- to reduce risk of suicide, depression, and other wellness concerns among students

Definition of HIB (Harassment, Intimidation or Bullying) (Part 1) means:

 Any gesture, written, verbal or physical act, or electronic communication, single incident or series that is reasonably perceived as motivated by any actual or perceived characteristic



- Cyber bullying in the form of information exchanged via email, text messages, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Snapchat, and other social media platforms is included as HIB under the ABR
- Behaviors in students as early as elementary school age



Such as:

- Race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, or mental or physical or sensory disability or by:
- "any other distinguishing characteristic" which may include:
 - New Kid in Town
 - Poor Athletic Ability
 - Academic Stereotype
 - Obesity
 - Can Be Almost Anything, including Power Differential

Definition of HIB (Part 2)

 Takes place on school property, school sponsored function, school bus, or off school grounds that substantially disrupts operation of school or rights of other students

AND



- A reasonable person should know under the circumstances has the effect of:
- a. Physically or emotionally harming to student or student property or places a student in reasonable fear of harm; OR
- Insulting or demeaning to student or group of students; OR
- c. Creates a hostile educational environment by interfering with the student's education or by severely or pervasively causing physical or emotional harm to the student.



Conflict is a mutually competitive or opposing action or engagement, including a disagreement, an argument or a fight which is a normal part of human development.

Bullying is <u>one-sided</u>, where one or more students are *victims* of one or more person's aggression, which is intended to physically or emotionally hurt the victim(s).



Know the HIB definition and all of its parts:

- Motivated by an actual or perceived distinguishing characteristic;
- Substantial disruption or interference with either the orderly operation of the school or the rights of other students;
- The result: (a) causes physical or emotional harm, or (b) is insulting or demeaning, or (c) creates a hostile educational environment.



Anti-Bullying Coordinator (District Level)

- Anti-Bullying Specialist (School Level)
- School Safety Teams (School Level)



- Appointed by Superintendent
- Provides data in collaboration with Superintendent to NJ DOE
- Coordinates and strengthens HIB Policy to prevent, identify and address HIB
 - Collaborates with Anti-Bullying Specialists, BOE and Superintendent
 - Meets at least twice a year with Anti-Bullying Specialists
 - Other related duties including staff training



- One at each school
- Appointed by Principal from currently employed staff
- Usually a school guidance counselor, school psychologist or another individual similarly trained
- Lead investigator of HIB concern
- Assists principal in defining range of responses to HIB
- Provides input on HIB policy revision
- Chairs School Safety / Climate Team

- Formed to develop, foster and maintain positive school climate, and to address issues, including HIB
- Meets at least twice each year
- Consists of Principal (or designee), and principal appoints:
 - Teacher in the school
 - Anti-Bullying Specialist (chair)
 - Parent of student in the school (receive redacted information)
 - Others as Principal determines

N.J.S.A. 18A:37-21



- 1. Receives reports of HIB incidents;
- Identifies and addresses patterns of HIB;
- 3. Strengthen school climate and policies to prevent and address HIB;
- 4. Educate the community to prevent and address HIB;
- Participate in training;
- Collaborate with ABC in data collection and HIB policy development;
- 7. Other duties as requested by Principal or ABC.

Parents may not participate in the activities of the SST/SCT that may compromise the confidentiality of students.



- Located on District website
- Alignment with BOE Policy 5600 Student Discipline/Code of Conduct
- Annual review/revision of Policy 5512
 - Annual updates must be provided to the Executive County Superintendent
 - Updated in August 2018 for the 18-19 school year



- Student confidentiality rights respected
- Due Process / hearing from all students involved
- Dual track obligation: HIB investigation alongside Student Code of Conduct Expectations
- Patterns of behavior or concerns to address
- 10 Day investigation timeline
- Notifications / Board and Superintendent Review
- Students with Disabilities
 - Required to Convene IEP Team Meeting if Target in confirmed HIB
 - Case manager involved to support the investigation

Goal is Remediation and Prevention of Reoccurrence



- MUST be annually established, implemented, documented and assessed
- First Monday in October "Week of Respect" to provide age appropriate instruction focusing on preventing HIB
- Must also provide throughout school year

District Anti-Bullying Initiative: No Place for Hate

- Developed by the Anti-Defamation League
- Creates inclusive school environments that celebrate diversity and challenge bias and bullying
- Fosters a culture free from bullying and intimidation
